This will provide a visual treat to the hundreds of Louisville area residents who drive through our City during this beautiful spring weekend.

Update on Pope Memorial Rain Garden

The Pope Memorial Rain Garden is nearly complete following the thaw in early December allowing the majority of plants to be installed. One of the goals of the Rain Garden (in addition to honoring long-time garden enthusiasts and residents Sara and Pat Pope) was to provide a visual feast of color throughout the year as well as to attract birds and butterflies with its flowers and foliage. Fine-leaved Inkberry Hollies were planted along the front with coarse-textured Oak Leaf Hydrangeas in the rear. Also included in the bed, are Virginia Sweet Spires and a Sycamore tree in the center of the bed. Other plantings include Summersweet, American Beautyberries, native Azaleas, and Fothergillas. A walking path has been created through the garden's central portion.

Five additional specimens will be planted in the spring: four American Cranberry bushes and a Carolina Silverbell tree to anchor the right side of the garden. Mulch, donated by the City of Audubon Park, will be laid down; and the various species will be labeled. Costs for the Memorial Rain Garden were raised by donations to honor the Popes and from Garden Club funds.

Placing more trees at this end of Curlew Park may appear excessive; however, a number of large Ash trees are in decline and will likely succumb to the Emerald Ash Borer. The Sweet Gums are likewise failing due in part to Phytophthera rot. With those items noted, the Garden Club's efforts have been dedicated to anticipating future needs within Curlew Park as well as honoring Pat and Sara (two long-time supporters of Audubon Park's trees and parks).

The Butterfly Bush

A common flowering shrub found during the summer months is the Butterfly Bush. It is also known by its botanical name "Buddleia" which was named after an English Clergyman, the Rev. Adam Buddle, in the 1770s. Clergy were long associated with botanists and gardens in England because such men were often ensconced in small villages in the countryside and spent time on scholarly work in botany as well as their clerical duties. A more hardy form of buddleias was introduced from Asia to North America and Europe in the late 1800s.

Also called "summer lilac" because its blooms resemble those of the lilac, the Butterfly Bush is a fast-growing flowering bush that is easy to grow and hard to kill. It likes sun and good drainage and tolerates urban pollution as well as alkaline soil. It is generally pest-free and can be pruned anytime (which is helpful since it can grow out of control and can reseed itself easily). For this reason, some consider the butterfly bush an invasive plant. There are over 100 different varieties of the Butterfly Bush with the most common being Buddleia davidii. It is hardy to minus 20 degrees Fahrenheit and grows to be between 6 and 15 feet tall. Colors include white, pink, fuchsia, red, purple, lavender, orange, and blue. From its name, you can deduce that the flowers of the bush (which resemble a bottle brush anywhere from 3-10 inches long) attract butterflies; however, the flowers also attract hummingbirds (especially the red blooms) as well as bees and other beneficial insects that are drawn to the sweet nectar. Be careful not to confuse this plant with the "butterfly weed" which also attracts butterflies (typically monarchs) to its milkweed-like pods.

FRIENDLY REMINDERS

 Night and early morning joggers and walkers are encouraged to wear light or reflective clothing.

- There is no parking permitted on the street or on parking pads between 2 A.M. and 6 A.M. There is also no parking permitted on the grass.
- Building, Tree, and Yard Sale permits are issued through City Hall. If you have a project in mind, a tree you would like to trim or remove on the easement, or if you would just like to have a yard sale, please contact or come by City Hall.
- Please report any street lights that are out or malfunctioning to City Hall at 637-5066. The information provided will then be forwarded on to LG&E for repair.
- With regards to pets, please keep in mind that your neighbors do NOT want your pets wandering in their yard or on the roadway in front of their houses leaving unpleasant surprises or attacking the pets they may have. Please make sure they are under control at all times and are not running around loose. We have also received complaints at City Hall of barking dogs and of cats on the prowl. Please try to keep your pets from disturbing your neighbors or the bird population in the area.
- In keeping with the beauty of the neighborhood, please try to avoid having yard signs placed on your property. Please keep in mind that if a yard sign is placed on the easement, it will be removed by the City.
- In relation to garbage collection, the collection days in the City are Tuesdays and Fridays. The yard waste and recycling are on Tuesdays only and are to be placed at the curb. Please keep in mind yard waste must be bundled and not to exceed 48 inches in length. Household garbage is collected at the rear of the house. Yard waste and recycling should NOT be placed at the street earlier than the evening before collection.

Please see the following holiday schedule:

For Memorial Day (May 30, 2011) week and July 4, 2011 week, all collections will be one day later during the week of that particular holiday.
