

Teacher charged with child abuse

Now the parent of a child alleged to have been abused wants the accused teacher off the school district's payroll.

A parent of one of four special needs children allegedly abused by a Venice Elementary School teacher is tired of waiting for the school district to fire her.

Diane Zales O'Neill, 45, of Sarasota, who was accused five months ago of abusing handicapped pupils at Venice Elementary School, was formally charged Thursday with four counts of felony child abuse for incidents that allegedly took place from Dec. 5, 2007, to Jan. 14, 2008.

Assistant State Attorney Dawn M. Buff's memo in the case states that the majority of the actions O'Neill is accused of are more in line with statutes prohibiting child abuse — an intentional act that could reasonably be expected to result in physical or mental injury than aggravated child abuse, the original charge. The state must

show torture or malicious punishment beyond a reasonable doubt to prove the higher charge.

O'Neill's arraignment is set for Aug. 8 at the Sarasota County Courthouse.

On the payroll

O'Neill was placed on paid administrative leave Jan. 28 by school principal Theresa Baus, and Baus initiated a school investigation. She remains on paid leave.

The parent, who wants to remain anonymous to protect her child, said the school district should terminate the teacher rather than continue her on the payroll.

"The fact that it took from February until now ... I thought it was ridiculous to wait. She should have been suspended with pay only until enough information was gathered," the parent said.

The parent questioned why

O'Neill is still being paid and said she is concerned that if the case is not resolved by the beginning of the next school year — "if she is not terminated by then" -O'Neill will still be under contract and will continue to get benefits as if she is an employed teacher and could still accrue retirement.

According to the parent, the school investigation was conducted by an outside party and concluded a couple of weeks ago. She said she called Michael Jones, executive director of the school district's human resources department, and his secretary told her they have the report in hand but would not do anything until the state attorney's office took action.

The parent said she questions why statutes are in place through the school board regarding disciplinary action that are not being used if they wait for the state attorney's office.

"The most important thing is that people understand that the school board has rules they are not enforcing. I worry what that says to other teachers, that she is

Beach plaza to reopen in August

Almost 60 years after the original Nokomis Beach Pavilion was built, the totally rebuilt replica is to be completed on time and will open in one month.

Sarasota County Parks & Recreation Department Supervisor Rob LaDue complimented the contractor, Howell Construction, for doing a great job. He announced the official ribboncutting for the renamed facility — Nokomis Beach Plaza — will be at 6 p.m. Friday, Sept. 19.

Visitors will see numerous changes to the combined north and south plaza. The new facilities include linear-access restrooms, a kitchen and community room. The surrounding plaza has been restored to the original design supervised by architect Jack West, who designed it in the early 1950s. Access to both parking areas has been re-engineered for better parking, particularly in the southern lot, where the entrance is being moved farther south to slow traffic. Posts, ropes, ribbon curbs and cement car bumpers are being constructed. The north lot has been reconfigured, reducing the impact on the dunes, reducing maintenance and making it user friendly and ADA accessible. Part of the boardwalk has been removed and replaced by posts and rope with access off the new covered seating area.

Proposals are in hand to bring back the concession stand in the south pavilion following renovations in the next 12 months. Built in the early 1950s, the building will be retrofitted, including repairs and replacement of the restroom facilities.

"Saltwater and corrosion batter the buildings, and we have the funding to repair everything," said LaDue.

Electrical service will be replaced and upgraded, providing for a large fryer and grill for the concession operator. Additional seating will be provided.

Following the recent introduction of smoke-free beach zones LaDue said, "Talking to lifeguards and Sarasota sheriffs confirms they have seen a dramatic reduction in smoking litter at Siesta Key and Nokomis Beach."

Take shelter from lightning

Lightning can strike when you least expect it. That's what makes it more dangerous than hurricanes and tornadoes combined.

About 47 people a year in Florida are injured or killed by lightning strikes. That's also what makes

Florida the lighting capital of the United States.

Sarasota County Emergency Management Chief Ed McCrane reminds residents that it's important to take lightning and thunderstorms seriously by seeking a safe shelter when storms approach.

During Florida summers, severe storms can

and lightning can strike 10 miles from rainfall. McCrane said residents are in danger of being struck by lightning if they hear thunder.

People are urged to use the "30/30 Rule" when they're outdoors. They should find shelter when the time between a lightning flash and thunder is 30 seconds or less. They also should remain in a safe location for 30 min-

utes following the final thunderclap.

Lightning strike victims often assume the threat has passed after thunderstorm, although lightning can travel far from the core of a storm's rain.

Nearly half of all lightening deaths happen in open areas. For safety, look for a substantial building, such as a home, away from windows, or a vehicle with a metal roof. Avoid trees, covered picnic shelters,

tents and convertibles.

If someone is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1 and get immediate medical help. Lightning strikes can cause cardiac arrest, burns and nerve damage.


Bystanders are in no danger when providing medical aid and CPR as victims don't carry an electrical charge. Many deaths can be prevented if a victim receives proper, immediate first aid.

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Lifestyles Committee dedicated to all

The Venice Lifestyles Committee met Wednesday afternoon with ears open to all voices, young and old.

The purpose of the committee is to advise city council on issues in the city concerning youth, senior citizens and disabled persons.

The two guest speakers at Wednesday's meeting hit all three bases.

Senior comfort

Sarasota County Senior Advisory Council Member Van Deist addressed the county's position on residential accessibility for seniors and disabled persons.

Deist explained there are two certifications being looked into: visitability and universal design. "Our council is trying to encourage commissioners on basic design requirements for the comfort of individuals," Deist said.

Components of universal design include an accessible bedroom and bathroom on the first floor of all residences.

"If grandma left her retirement home to come visit, we want her to be comfortable and able to function easily," Deist said.

Other proposed elements include wide-passage doors either 34 or 36 inches wide and low-rise windows that are wheelchair-friendly.

Bathrooms, kitchens and hallways are encouraged to be 5 feet in diameter to ensure movability.

"These are important criteria, and we are trying to keep it simple," Deist said. "Keep in mind it is important for accessibility to be comfortable for the people in the community and the people you care about."

City Council Member Sue Lang said council voted in the comprehensive plan to make this topic a priority.

Lifestyles Committee member Kathy Kurz said the federal government is looking for public input on the new accessibility design for the Americans with **Disabilities Act.**

This is a chance for city and county to come together and have public input," Kurz said.

Community Youth Development Program Assistant L'tea Humphrey Woodward addressed the committee about the board position for a student volunteer. Woodward presented the Students Taking Active Roles program.

According to the CYD Web site, STAR "prepares students to serve as decision-makers in Sarasota County through training in civics, communication, leadership, meeting roles and responsibilities, problem solving, and community assessment skills."

After this program, students are expected to be prepared to serve as a board member for different councils.

The STAR program has already put a member on the city of Venice Parks and Recreation Advisory Board.

Committee Chair Dick Dodderidge said there's an opening for a high school student on his board.

"This could be step one," Dodderidge said.

Kruz then addressed the need for the committee to explore all options.

"The position needs to be open to any student," Kruz said.

Committee Member David Ursel thought of STAR as another avenue to getting youth involved.

Dodderidge then suggested looking into Venice High's volunteer program as well.

The youth position requires the approval of the mayor and city council.

Lang suggested the committee narrow down its choice to one organization and then suggest it to council.

The nomination process for the youth vacancy will then flow, Lang said.

County OKs loans for library, beach upgrades

The Sarasota County commissioners unanimously approved \$10.5 million in short-term loans Wednesday to expedite the funding of projects earmarked by the recently passed 1-cent sales surtax.

Among South County projects awaiting the funding were: • The North Port Health

and Family Service Center Facility (\$1.025 million)

• The Elsie Quirk Library Remodel Project (\$500,000) • The Manasota Beach Restroom Project (\$81,000) • The Caspersen Beach Restroom Project (\$50,000)

Jim Ley advocated the speedy passage of the approval for the borrowing, maintaining it would mirror the positive effects of a similar action initiated in May, which occurred davs after voters approved bonding up to \$300 million for projects earmarked for future sales tax

"(That) provided monies for things like purchaseapproved right of way, sidewalks, and the initiation of some resurfacing activity," Ley said. "This commercial paper bor(some) projects quickly (and) expedites the projects in the stimulus plan.'

Commission Chair Shannon Staub supported the action, aimed at kickstarting the local econo-

at home and getting a paycheck even after three investigations say the abuse occurred and they (school district) is not willing to let her go until 'we see what the state attorney's office does,' " the parent said Jones' office said.

"Why bother with their own investigation ... with spending that money?" the parent asked.

School district

Jones declined to comment, but Scott Ferguson, of the school district's communications office, said, "People are innocent until proven guilty, and she (O'Neill) will be on administrative leave pending the result of the case with the state attorney's office."

Ferguson said O'Neill will not be teaching in the classroom next school year because of the legal issues. "We presume innocence," Fer-

guson said. "It is part of the American justice system, and sometimes the wheels go slowly."

According to Ferguson, whatever monies O'Neill earns she gets to keep.

People do not give back any pay they receive while undergoing the process of waiting for a trial and being innocent until proven guilty. That is just the way the system

works," he said.

Kids improved

The parent said she met with the parents of the other three allegedly abused special needs children recently, and they all said their children are sleeping better and they have seen some improvements since O'Neill was removed from the classroom.

"At the same time, we are still seeing some ramifications, like flinching" she said. "It is difficult to tell because they can't speak. And that is part of the reason it is so difficult to prove."

Given that timeline, City Engineer Nancy Woodley, who will become interim city manager next month, said making the extended deadline of Oct. 1 was unlikely.

Help wanted

Topic two was the budget, where Martin sees some hard work ahead.

'We could get through this year, probably, without bleeding too badly," he said, with staff having presented a budget balanced at the current 2.779 millage rate. (A mill is \$1 per \$1,000 of a home's assessed value.) But, he said, the Legislature isn't done with tax reform and next year might consider capping local tax rates at their existing levels, perhaps allowing only a minimal increase, perhaps by referendum.

Council voted Tuesday to set the rate at 3.3588 mills for discussion purposes. It can be lowered but not raised during the budgeting process.

The higher rate would give the city about \$100,000 more tax revenue than last year; the current rate would bring in about \$2 million less.

"That's something the public is going to have to help council decide," he said.

Complicated

So far only one Airport Advisory Board member has complied with council's demand for their resignations. Martin said Walter Hake, a relatively recent appointee, has tendered

What the airport's detractors just don't get

n his book "True Enough," Farhad Manjoo argues that what we believe colors our perception of reality and that, in the Internet age, we can readily find people who share those beliefs and that perception, even if it is demonstrably wrong.

In common parlance that point of view is sometimes known as "Don't confuse me with the facts."

That seems to us to be the attitude of some people on both sides of the Venice Municipal Airport debate. We discussed in Wednesday's editorial some points we think the airport's boosters have failed to come to terms with. Here are some realities its critics should acknowledge.

First, if you moved here since the mid-'40s, the airport *was* there when you got here. That sounds snide, but it's still true, and it costs you some sympathy, especially among the pilots and businesses at the airport.

Similarly, complaints about the size and type of planes, or the number of take-offs and landings, hit a lot of deaf ears. By law, the airport has to be available for any plane that wants to and can use it, and you know there has never been a guarantee about the amount or type of traffic it would handle. There are more people here every year, and more traffic on our roads; why would you think the airport would buck that trend?

Now, that's not to say the airport and the pilots don't have to be good neighbors. We need strong noise-abatement rules and pollution buffers — in general, more respect for the people who do live close to the airport.

Second, the city can't do most of the things people have suggested regarding the airport.

Shut down the airport and the land reverts to the federal government because it is no longer being used for aviation purposes. Unless, of course, the city creates another airport to replace it — something there is neither the land nor the money for. And if there were, there's no guarantee there would be no development on this prime real estate. Which do you prefer: condos or planes?

Attempting to place restrictions on the planes that use the airport would risk the wrath of the Federal Aviation Administration. Without a control tower, enforcement that would be tricky anyway. There appears to be a legal problem — and a practical one — with charging landing fees, a suggested source of revenue.

Third, the airport needs to make money because it is supposed to be selfsustaining. If landing fees are out and existing leases are locked in, that means finding new sources of revenue — new leases or other paying uses of airport property. Or we could see what the FAA thinks of the airport enterprise fund being in the red.

The last time we fought it, over the Lake Venice Golf Club lease, it withheld the funds to redo runway 13/31. What would happen if the economic stability of the entire operation appeared to be in jeopardy? Experienced pilots say you don't want the federal government running your airport.

Fourth, the airport really does contribute to our economy, even though you may not feel the direct impact, which is difficult to quantify. If it's not the gateway to Venice, it certainly is a gateway, and the businesses there employ dozens of people. A commerce park at the arena site would provide many more jobs and rid the city of an eyesore. Our final point is that the condition of runway 4/22 really is a safety issue, and more. Opinions vary about how bad it is, but if planes are avoiding it that means more noise for the neighbors. If they're not, then pilots are risking damage to their planes on take-off, already a dangerous part of any flight.

Also, consider the impact on the airport's capacity in the admittedly unlikely event it is needed for hurricane relief.

Complain if you want about spending money to benefit a privileged few. It's a public transportation obligation the city assumed when it accepted the land from the federal government after World War II.

We hope these two editorials have put the key issues into clearer relief. They are the same ones we identified months ago, before emotion got the worst of so many people: What can be done to avoid taking any part of the golf course and to protect the rights of the owners of the homes that appear to be in a runway protection zone?

Those aren't the only issues, just the ones that have gotten spun the most for political gain. That needs to stop.

Mary O'Nesky Venice pends on which evacuation zone you live in. Maps are available online at scgov.net or in the hurricane guides. As a storm approaches, the Sarasota County Emergency Operations center will issue evacuation orders by zone, depending on the intensity of the storm. But your evacuation zone isn't the only factor to consider.

Even if you don't live in a mandatory evacuation zone, your house may not be safe if it wasn't constructed to meet recent Florida building codes. If you haven't done a wind inspection on your house, of if you don't have storm shutters, it may not be safe to stay.

This is especially true in some areas of the county that have high concentrations of mobile homes or older homes constructed before we learned how easily wind can damage them.

If you plan to stay home, remember your ABC'S of preparation:

Anchor your roof, especially if it was built before 1994 and is gabled.
Brace the entry and garage doors, where 80 percent of wind damage starts.

• Cover windows with secure impact-resistant shutters or other window protection systems.

• Safe, interior rooms provide more protection

than rooms with windows and doors.

Preparing your neighborhood for a storm is as important as preparing your home. Sarasota County is helping residents develop Neighborhood Preparedness Programs with the goal of making families self-sufficient for up to seven days following a storm. Neighborhood organizations can provide assistance when police, fire, emergency service and other workers may be overwhelmed with demands.

A NPP includes 25 to 50 households and is lead by a Neighborhood Disaster Team. For assistance in starting a NPP in your neighborhood or homeowners association, call the county Call Center at 861-5000 and ask about the Neighborhood Preparedness Program.

Sarasota County Emergency Management will keep residents informed as storms approach and residents can count on us for help after a storm passes. But residents need to be prepared and self-sufficient until we can respond.

Being prepared is the best way to make sure your family is ready for any disaster.

Business partners are going Softee

Partners Rob Spikol and Dennis Krumanocker are the new, self-proclaimed Mister Softees of Venice.

They have secured the franchise to bring these specialty ice cream trucks to Southwest Florida. Based in and working from Venice, they will initially operate five trucks, and within five years plan to have 50 Mister Softees operating from Tampa to Naples.

School friends, they grew up in Cherry Hill, N.J. Spikol became a commercial Realtor, moving to Venice 12 months ago to join Richard Bradway & Associates. Krumanocker came to Sarasota a few years ago, opened Fabulous Flowers in Englewood and recently sold it.

"It's a step back in a forward kind of way," said Spikol, referring to the jingle chime as a call of the wild to kids of every age, particularly people from up North.

The \$130,000 customdesigned Mister Softee trucks are ice cream shops on wheels, equipped with video cameras and sensors enabling drivers to monitor all around the vehicle. Similar to a school bus, the trucks are equipped with flashing lights on front rear and sides, plus a yield sign, "Slow Children." A front bumper swing-

arm extends, blocking a child or person from walking directly in front of the vehicle.

Three years ago Spikol and Krumanocker began talking about the project. Within the past few days their first vehicle was delivered and is already active in the Venice community. Additional territories being introduced include unincorporated Sarasota, Englewood, Port Charlotte and Punta Gorda, eventually expanding to Hillsborough, Pinellas, Manatee, Sarasota Charlotte, Lee and Collier counties.

Mister Softee has been building ice cream trucks for 56 years. Totally selfcontained, the vehicle has its own generators powering all the ice cream machines and air conditioning. Carrying 100 gallons of ice cream mix, the

truck can serve 100,000 customers over a threeday weekend.

'We also supply milk shakes, soda floats, sundaes, flushies, dips, sprinkles — it is an ice cream store on wheels," said Spikol.

Mister Softee does not have a retail store program, but the partners are developing the first store in Venice at 509 North Tamiami Trail, in Fisherman's Marina near Marker 4. Concentrating on ice cream-related products and, specific to Florida, orange-flavored ice cream they will be opening more neighborhood stores.

Spikol will operate the new venture in conjunction with his commercial realty practice. Krumanocker is organizing and operating the Mister Softee fleet.

Sales numbers are inching upward

I thought it would be appropriate this month to provide the latest sales statistics and analysis from the Florida Association of Realtors. There is now concrete proof that more listings are turning into sales - good news for sellers and great buys for buyers.

positive signs in their local housing markets, with an uptick in existing home and condominium sales in May 2008 from April, according to the latest housing statistics released by the Florida Association of Realtors.


A total of 12,175 existing single-family homes sold in May, up 8.7 percent over the previous month when 11,200 homes changed hands statewide. Existing condo sales statewide rose 3 percent, with a total of 4,018 units sold in May compared with 3,900 condos in April

The median price for both existing single-family homes and existing condos increased slightly as well during the onemonth period. The existing-home median price in May was \$203,300, up 2.2 percent from April's median price of \$198,900. The median price of an existing condo last month was \$181,800, up 1.5 percent from April's figure of \$179,200. In the year-to-year comparison, a total of 12,175 existing homes sold statewide last month while 12,882 homes sold in May 2007, a decrease of 5 percent, according to FAR. Florida's median sales price for existing homes last month was \$203,300; a year ago it was \$239,000, a 15-percent decrease.

But looking back to May 2003, the statewide median sales price for single-family homes has increased about 34.5 percent over the five-yearperiod, according to FAR records.

In a year-to-year comparison for condos, 4,018 units sold statewide compared to 4,458 in May 2007, a 10-percent decline. The statewide existingcondo median sales price last month was \$181,800; in May 2007 it was \$210,200, a 14-percent decrease.

Among the state's larger markets, the Sarasota-Bradenton Metropolitan Statistical Area reported a total of 858 homes sold in May compared to 772 homes a year ago, an 11percent increase. The existing home median sales price was \$246,200; a year ago, it was \$294,700, a 16-percent decrease. A total of 331 existing condos sold in the MSA last month compared to 339 condos the previous May, a decrease of 2 percent. The market's existing condo median price remained stable at \$246,400; a year ago, it was \$246,200.





Recently while driving in and around our area I observed many drivers operating their vehicles with the windows down. Obviously, when driving with the windows open they probably do not have their air conditioners engaged.

Folks are not using air conditioning in order to save gasoline. According to the auto club, you can save approximately 1 to 2 gallons a tank if you drive without using the air conditioner.

The continuing astronomical spike in fuel prices has resulted in a number of adjustments put in place to conserve gasoline and cut the cost of operating a vehicle.

Unfortunately the high prices have also resulted in an increase in crime statistics.

Drive-off larcenies at gas stations have more than tripled.

Local authorities have investigated a number of thefts from fuel storage tanks in rural areas that contain gasoline and diesel fuel. These larcenies have resulted in increased security at those locations and the use of surveillance cameras.

Crooks use power tools to drill holes in tanks to siphon gasoline. Using this method to steal fuel presents the danger of explosion and fire, not only to the thief, but the victim. There is always some spillage, and should someone drop a cigarette in that area, the consequences could be catastrophic. And consider the trail of gas left if the operator drives away and does not notice the fuel being left along the route.

Thieves are also siphoning gasoline directly from vehicles parked at malls, on streets, in front of homes and in driveways.

You must also be on guard for unscrupulous gas stations that calibrate their pumps to show more gas was pumped than you actually received. In essence, you pay more for less fuel.

If you are suspicious and feel you are being victimized, use the following method to combat this scam.

Put exactly 10 gallons into your tank, then look at the dollar amount. If the dollar amount is not exactly 10 times the price of the fuel you have purchased, the pumps are rigged. Report the incident to the Attorney General's Office at (850) 414-3300.

Hopefully, help with high gas prices may soon be on the way. A Senate committee is studying the situation and preliminary reports indicate that much of the problem stems from gas prices inflated by speculation, suggesting that investors should have to pay larger margins

up front.

Sean Cota, a regional chair of the Petroleum Marketers Association, testified before the committee. Based on testimony received, Sen. Byron Dorgan, D-N.D., stated stock speculation requires a 50 percent margin, whereas oil commodities only require 5 percent to 7 percent.

To avoid being a victim of gasoline theft, try to park in well-lighted areas. If you do not have a locking gas cap on your vehicle, purchase one, and put your car in the garage, especially at night.

Go to autos.msn.com/ everyday/gasstations.aspx?zi p=&src=Next to find the lowest fuel prices in your area. Another way to save on gas is to combine trips and reduce your speed.

There's something that just seems more sporting about kayak fishing. I think it's the fact you can't drink as many Belgian Budweisers while participating.

On a real fishing boat — that is, one with a motor — you can get as sloshed as you want and still stand a good chance of outwitting the marine life. On a kayak you stand a better chance of sloshing yourself overboard.

I bought a used kayak a couple of weeks ago and it only took me a few (alcohol-free) tries to turn it over and end up swimming back to the beach. Young ballers ready to wrap up summer ball

The Venice High School girls basketball team lacks experience.

The Lady Indians lost their entire starting lineup and most of their bench when eight seniors graduated in May. They have two returning varsity players in junior Kirsten Walchle and sophomore Leanne Marsden, but everyone else is completely green. So Venice has been working hard this summer.

"We've probably played 45-50 games this summer as a team, so that's like three seasons," Head Coach Bruce Reichenbach said. In one 10-day stretch, Venice played 20 games.

"It's surprising to a lot of people that they play that many, but you really have to to compete with some of the good teams," Reichenbach said.

The "offseason" wraps up next week when Venice takes on one of District 5A-12's frontrunners, North Port High School. After that game, which could serve as a measuring stick for the regular season, the Indians finally get a

"What's good is that all of our young kids have really made great strides this summer," he said. "The key was to get the young kids on the court as many games as we could because they're the ones that have to step up."

The two returning varsity players, Marsden and Walchle, figure to be the team leaders. After that, two — maybe even three — freshmen are expected to start or at least see significant playing time on the varsity team.

Reichenbach has been very complimentary of Juliana Cavallaro all summer; he also revealed that Hannah Revels will likely contribute considerably. But the biggest surprise this summer has been the progress of freshman Lauren Hackett.

Hackett played just one year of organized basketball, last season at Pine View School, before joining the Venice Velocity, the area's girls youth basketball program directed by Ross and Reichenbach. Now she appears to be a possible four-year varsity player. "Now she's not only playing varsity but she could start," Ross said. "She has a fantastic work ethic, she listens and applies. You can't beat that."

To compete with North Port and Southeast high schools, Venice will need big contributions from young players. Last year the Indians finished 14-13 with five senior starters, but Reichenbach doesn't see any reason they can't at least equal that.

"Our freshmen, they've been sort of thrown in the fire," he said. "It's really a time that they can get to know where their teammates go when they penetrate and how to help their teammates on defense.



- As he considered options for next year, Ryan Newman used a familiar phrase to describe his career: "Coulda. Woulda. Shoulda.'
- Jeff Gordon has never gone four years without a Brickyard victory. This is the fourth year since he won for the fourth time in 2004.
- Tony Stewart didn't have to move back to Chevrolet to get Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s assistance. 'I work with him regardless,' said Junior. "I've been working with him all the time, no matter what he's driving. ... Give and take with him; (and) he'll take care of you."
- Earnhardt Jr., by the way, said he has no interest in buying DEI. I don't mean this in a bad way, but I do not and would not have any interest in purchasing it," he said. Tony Stewart is at wits' end. Always superstitious, Stewart's streak of tough luck has left him reeling. "I'm scared to get in correction

I'm scared to get in cars, planes, everything," he said, partly in jest. "I'm scared to walk, open doors with-out looking before I walk through ... it's the oddest year I think I've ever seen.'

The 37-year-old Stewart has won 32 races and two championships at NASCAR's highest level. So far in 2008, though, he hasn't scored. He's led 531 laps. He's lost because of fuel mileage, because he had a flat tire and because he came down with the flu and had to be relieved.

There are guys who have had a lot worse seasons than we've ever had, but this is a terrible year for us and

and had. ... I don't know how long it's going to last. Hopefully, it's not much longer."

Stewart could well be right. He's won the Allstate 400 at the Brickvard twice in the last three years. Indianapolis Motor Speedway is his favorite place. He dreamed about Indy while growing up in Columbus, Ind.

The season of discontent has taught Stewart lessons in humility.

'It just reminds you of the stretches that you've had where everything goes right," he said. "It reminds you of how hard those are to have, and when you do get a string like that, how much to appreciate it versus days when you think you should've won and vou didn't.

But there's still business to attend to at JGR.

"We try to win the race every week, just like we always have," Stewart said. "We've never a string of bad luck like this. ... It's not something that you sit through and formulate. It's luck. It just comes in waves. We've had short periods of bad luck, but we've never had bad luck like we've had this year."



Detert, Grant seek GOP Senate nomination

Lonnie Ammaz is paying about twice as much for insurance for his small business this year as he did in 2007.

He's not happy about that and he wants whoever winds up as his state senator to do something about what he thinks are runaway insurance costs.

"Whoever wins the election needs to do something to take control of these insurance companies," said Ammaz, who runs Louie's Bicycles in North Port. "They keep raising their rates at the same time they're posting record profits. They're going to drive some of us out of business because we can't afford our insurance costs."

The Aug. 26 GOP primary for the District 23 state Senate seat pits former state Rep. Nancy Detert, 63, of Venice against current state Rep. Michael Grant, a 58-yearold Port Charlotte businessman. Both are Republican Party powerhouses and both have been successful business owners.

Detert founded and ran a mortgage company in Venice from 1983 until 2007, when she sold it. She now works in marketing for a prominent real estate firm. Grant, meanwhile, started a small nonemergency ambulance service in Port Charlotte that now has additional offices in Venice and Sarasota.

Both candidates understand what it takes to make a business run on a day-to-day basis, which gives Ammaz and other business owners a measure of hope. Despite those similarities, however, Detert and Grant are not two peas in a pod.

Differences

Grant, for example, bills himself as a dyed-in-thewool conservative. Detert says she's more of an oldfashioned Republican with a reputation in Tallahassee as being a practical, common-sense lawmaker.

Detert echoed his comment.

"You can just do more," she said, "and, really, isn't

that why you run for office?" The winner of the Aug. 26 GOP primary will face Democrat Morgan Bentley and write-in candidate Robert Waechter, both of Sarasota.



Grant says the top three issues in the district are property taxes, property insurance and energy.

"If Congress allows the states to drill offshore, we could be on our way to establishing energy inde-pendence, but I don't think our exploration of new energy sources should be limited to natural gas and oil," he said.

He favors investigating alternative energy sources including coal, wind and tidal power.

Detert agrees that ener-gy is on the list of the top issues facing District 23 residents. Like Grant, she favors exploring for oil in the Gulf and seeking out alternative energy sources. She said, however, that something must be done to shore up the economy.

"I think the economy is the No. 1 issue in the district," she said. "More and more people are worried about just keeping their jobs and their houses."

Experience





Putting it together

This is the sixth year for Mission Venice.

The concept was developed by a Venice High School student, Deanna Pfundtner, when she was a junior in high school. She had just learned that she'd been rejected from her dream job as a church summer camp counselor, and she wondered what kind of a message God was sending her.

After a long, sleepless night, she came to her youth leader and announced that she wanted to organize a week-long, student-run, multi-church mission trip to her hometown. And she wanted it to happen during the first week of summer break, which was only 12 weeks away. Sean Ruehr and Miranda Coleman learn a little bit about teamwork on the first day of the Mission Venice program.

The event went off with amazingly few missteps, and ever since, it has been run by students, who are coached by adult youth leaders. This year, a group of students met for breakfast before school once a week, starting in February. Two rare fiberglass beauties



As a boy of 11, George was pumping gas at a family friend's Atlantic station in Braintree, Mass., followed up by doing oil changes, tuneups and mechanical repairs. Such part-time "employment" brought him into contact with some fancy "wheels." With that background, the Navy offered him a deal — from 1955-1959, he was a jet engine mechanic. Civilian life was good to him car-wise —he had, at one time or another, a 1939 Ford, a 1950 Caddy, a 1952 Chevrolet Fleetline, a 1953 Studebaker coup, a 1959 Vespa and his favorite, a 1951 Mercury. Of course, he wishes some of those were still in their garage ! Naturally, after retiring in 1998 as engineering project manager at Gillette Co. (Barbara's job was performance improvement statistician for Caritas Christi Healthcare Systems), there remained the urge to own a collector car or maybe two. The couple have four children, 12 grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren. This will come as a surprise to those who know them, due to them looking so young. "Oh, the good life" — surely you remember the Tony Bennett song? Back to cars — they wanted special interest-



type vehicles, ones that would be dependable, easy to maintain and not cookie-cutter styles. Both came via the Internet, the reproduction Cord from a Cadillac dealer in Illinois in 2000. The 1964 Avanti, an original factory-built Studebaker, one of 807 built, was designed by Raymond Lowry in less than 90 days to be an image-maker for this floundering manufacturer. That effort in 1961 led to an early 1963 model that actually hit the showrooms in 1962. It had a fiberglass body over a special frame; a 289-cubic-inch engine turning out 240 horsepower up to 335 hp with a supercharger. Weighing only 3140 pounds, they were fast! A heavily modified version was clocked at 172 mph and when tweaked even more, ran 212 mph on the salt flats. Chamberlain's is a standard 240 hp, three-speed automatic with many power accessories and power front brakes, which all Avantis had. Its engine is very ample developing crisp performance. The sadly, more than Corvette. This plus slow, poor production methods restricted volume caused Studebaker to close down the Avanti (Italian, meaning "Forward") division and the Hawk series shortly after introducing the almost unchanged 1963 models as 1964s. The dies and all parts were sold, resulting in Avanti II. That company sold to another who is still turning out this "Forever young - timeless" design. At least that's what I call it. George and Barbara made the deal to purchase their Avanti online from O'Hara Restorations in Frostproof, Fla., in 2005. They are rightfully proud of it, and it shows. Going backward to the Cord, which was part of the Auburn, Dusenberg Cord Company where Erret L. Cord became president in 1926. The Depression wiped them out, yet Cord gathered enough backers to create some powerful sporty models known as 1936-37s called 810's and 812's. Things didn't work out and once more they were shut down, permanently this time.

was built in 1969. Bill Lear of Lear Jet fame purchased the rights to the Cord name and set up a factory in Tulsa, Okla. He produced about 400 Cord reproductions, 320 with Ford 302 Mustang drive lines, 80 with 440 Chrysler drive lines. The Ford powered cars, which is what we have, were 80 percent of the original Cord size, sometimes referred to the "three-quarter Cord." The Chrysler powered cars were full-sized. Gordon Buhrig, the designer of the original Cord, redesigned this scaleddown car with a fiberglass body, equipped with A/C, power steering and an automatic transmission. Our Cord is a "fun car to drive!"

This twosome, with their twosome of rare drivable automobiles, can be found most anywhere you see a hobby gathering. 

An idle solution to a racing engine

Dear Tom and Ray: A friend of mine has a 1997 Honda CR-V, which he bought used a few years ago. It is generally in good shape but has a problem that has become more and more alarming during the past year or so. Sometimes, while driving, the engine will start to race, and the car refuses to slow down. When the engine is racing, my friend has to step on the brakes very hard to get the car to slow down. Usually, after getting the car to slow down, the engine stops racing. But lately, sometimes it hasn't stopped racing. It seems to be getting worse. The CR-V has been to the dealer several times, but the mechanics have found nothing. The problem doesn't happen when they have it. They say they have never heard of the problem. What could this problem be? Is it fixable? Thank you for your help! — Neil

RAY: Funny you should mention it, Neil. Just the other day, we had a 1997 Honda CR-V in our shop with the same exact problem.

TOM: So, what was it? RAY: We had no idea either. We couldn't get it to misbehave for us. We checked the computer for codes, to see if any of the engine sensors were malfunctioning. We found nothing. We

checked the database for any service bulletins or anything that would provide a hint. Nada. So finally, out of desperation, we cleaned the throttle body and added some fuel-injector cleaner to the gas tank.

TOM: And that fixed it?

RAY: Well, no. Not really. We still don't know what's wrong with it. But I'll tell you what I plan to do next, when the customer comes back in waving a baseball bat at me. I'll try to clean the idle air control.

TOM: The IAC is a device that's responsible

for boosting the idle speed when certain conditions are met. For instance, if the fuel-air mixture is too rich, a sensor will send a signal to the car's computer, and the computer will instruct the IAC to send in more air to boost the idle.

RAY: Or, if you turn on your air conditioner, which requires a lot of power, a sensor tells the computer that the airconditioning compressor is on, and the computer then tells the IAC to raise the idle speed to compensate for the extra load. So it's possible that the IAC is

sticking in the open position sometimes. And perhaps cleaning it will solve the problem.

TOM: You think so? RAY: Well, no. Not really. Actually, it might. But if it doesn't, I'd probably replace the IAC next, which is roughly a \$400 job. TOM: OK. Now I know

why you want to try cleaning it first. RAY: Right. Unfortu-

nately, if it's not the IAC, you'd have to look next at the computer itself. But in all my years of working on CR-Vs, I've never had to replace a computer. So I doubt that's the problem.

TOM: We'll certainly report back if we solve this problem, Neil, and you guys do the same (or, if anyone else has solved this problem on a CR-V, drop us a note at our Web site, cartalk.com).

RAY: But in the meantime, at least make sure your friend knows that he can always shift into neutral when the engine is racing. That'll stop the car from accelerating, and it's far preferable to crashing.

Engine's hot problem may be cooling fan

Dear Tom and Ray: I was coming home from bowling the other night, and I passed my buddy going down the road. So we stopped in

the road and were talking. Then all of a sudden he asked me, "What the heck is that?" I looked up at my engine, and it was either steaming or smoking. I was worried, so I popped the hood, and we opened it up. You definitely could smell antifreeze burning, and the smoke was coming from the radiator. Do you think that I have a bad radiator and need to replace the entire thing? Now there is antifreeze coming from under the car, so someone told me to put Bar's Leaks in the radiator. Oh yeah, I have a 1991 Pontiac 6000 LE, with a V-6. Thanks. — Travis

RAY: I'd start by checking the simple stuff first, Travis. The thing I'd suspect first would be the cooling fan.


TOM: Let's say, just for the sake of argument, that your cooling fan bit the dust at some point. Like in 1998. Or last week. You might not have noticed because as long as you're moving, air is flowing through the radiator and helping to cool the engine.

RAY: It's only when you stop, say, at a railroad crossing, to let a 200-car freight train go by, or to chat with your buddy, that you really need the cooling fan to simulate the airflow you normally get when the car is moving.

TOM: So, while you sat there chatting for five, 10, 15 minutes, with no cooling fan, the engine was getting hotter and hotter. Finally, it overheated, your coolant boiled over, and that boiling coolant blew a hole in a weakened hose or maybe even the radiator itself. That explains the steam, the smell of hot coolant and the puddle under your car.

RAY: Now, it's possible that with a car this old, you may need a cooling fan, a new hose, a new radiator AND a new engine as well. So there are no guarantees here, Travis. But start with the simple, inexpensive stuff first, and take it a step at a time.

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Four-door truck doesn't have to be full size

FOR THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Sales of pickup trucks are dropping precipitously this year because buyers dont want big, gasoline-guzzling vehicles. But the 2008 Nissan Frontier Crew Cab isnt a big, V-8-powered pickup truck. Its a mid-size pickup with strong V-6, an accommodating interior and two sizes of truck bed — 5 and 6 feet long.

With a starting manufacturers suggested retail price, including destination charge, of \$22,025, the Frontier Crew Cab carries the lowest starting price of all mid-size pickup trucks with two rows of seats and four doors. This starting price is for a two-wheel-drive Crew Cab SE with manual transmission.

The lowest-priced 2008 Frontier Crew Cab with automatic transmission is \$23,075, while a Frontier Crew Cab with four-wheel-drive starts at \$24,725.

These prices compare with the \$23,225 starting retail price for a two-wheel-drive, V-6-powered 2008 Toyota Tacoma Double Cab, offered only with automatic, and the \$22,275 for a 2008 Chevrolet Colorado Crew Cab with automatic and two-wheeldrive and four-cylinder engine.

Its also worth noting the Frontier is a recommended vehicle of Consumer Reports magazine, where its predicted reliability is better than average.

Ive always liked the Frontier for its utility. A driver can put bicycles into the truck bed and head to the park, or stock camping supplies back there and spend time at a campground and fishing spot with nary a problem.

This is especially true because the Frontier has good ground clearance underneath it - at least 8.6 inches and so can navigate the dips and rocks on off-road trails well.

Note that a spray-on bedliner is standard in all Frontiers to help keep the steel bed from getting scratched. A track system with tie down locations also comes standard back there and helps secure items in the bed.

The Crew Cabs bench back seat offers 33.6 inches of legroom and a comfortable 38.7 inches of headroom. But the seat cushion back there is a bit short. If the back seat isnt being used, the rear bench can be folded against the rear cabin wall to provide a wide, carpeted storage spot.

Passengers notice quickly that theyre riding in a truck, not a car, as the Frontier shudders a bit over big road bumps. The Frontier is a traditional, body-on-frame truck that uses the same platform of the larger, Nissan Titan pickup. So the ride doesnt have car-like refinement.

But then, a car wouldnt be able to provide the kind of good views out and over many other vehicles on the road, and it certainly cant match the Frontiers rugged demeanor off road, particularly in four-wheel-drive trim. The Frontier includes low gearing for such adventure

The interior is well-arranged, but the extensive use of hard plastics is less than impressive and couldnt be overlooked even in the test Frontier that had optional leather seat trim.

I also had a difficult time parking the test truck. Even though it only had a 5foot-long bed, it was a lengthy vehicle and didnt fit in many curbside parking spots. Its also difficult to see whats directly behind the tailgate as a driver backs up.

Front seats were comfortable. At 5 feet 4, I had to scooch up onto the drivers seat to get inside.

My passengers and I readily heard the 4-liter, double overhead cam V-6. It

sounded strong and confident and it certainly propelled the pickup with gusto at startup. Theres no wimpy power in this truck, even though it doesn't have a V-8.

This is due in part to a generous 261 horsepower and 281 foot-pounds of torque that the engine develops. Its more than the 210 horsepower and 235 footpound of torque in the V-6-powered Dodge Dakota Crew Cab and the 236 horses and 266 foot-pounds of torque thats in the V-6-powered Tacoma.

Indeed, the engine in the Frontier Crew Cab never left me lacking for passing power on country roads or climbing power on mountain highways.

I just wish fuel economy was better.

The federal government rating for the Frontier Crew Cab in four-wheel-drive is just 14 miles per gallon in city driving, and in mostly city driving, I managed just 14.6 mpg in the tester. The 14-mpg city rating for the four-wheel-drive model is just 2 mpg better than the rating for a V-8-powered, four-wheel-drive, full-size Nissan Titan pickup truck.

On the highway, the Frontier is rated at 19 mpg, which is just 2 mpg better than the Titan. Both city and highway ratings are notably lower than the comparable Tacoma.

Note that the maximum towing capacity for a Frontier Crew Cab is 6,300 pounds, just shy of the maximum 6,500 for the Tacoma.

Id prefer that the Frontiers curtain air bags and side seat-mounted air bags be standard equipment. As it is, they are optional, which is unusual today. Nissan also charges extra for a Traction Package that adds vehicle stability control and some helpful traction features.

The 2008 Frontier earned four out of five stars in federal government front crash testing and five out of five stars in side crash testing.

There was a safety recall in January of 5,523 Nissan vehicles, including Frontiers, from the 2008 model year because a label on the truck incorrectly stated the vehicle capacity weight. New labels were being distributed.

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treks and seems right at home on both pavement and dirt.

The Frontiers power rack-and-pinion steering has good on-center feel. But as youd expect in a tall-riding pickup, passengers notice some body lean in curves and turns. In the test truck with uplevel, 17-inch tires, there was road noise and, at highway speeds, some wind noise.


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
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

So you want to hunt alligators

The other day I drove by a small group of people huddled around a pickup truck with a caged trailer in a parking lot and noticed bystanders snapping photos with their cell phones. Curiosity got the best of me, so I pulled into the lot to rubberneck. There, in the cage, was a huge alligator — a nuisance gator — a trapper had caught. It was clear that the gator wasn't very happy about its predicament. It came out of a local golf course pond and apparently didn't like what was about to happen to it. I assumed it was to be transported to another location, but I didn't ask, so I really don't know its fate.

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It was an awesome specimen; one that I certainly wouldn't want to tangle with. So it was with some interest that I read a press release

from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission about alligator hunting. Apparently there are a lot of folks that do want to tangle with gators because, "All hunt permits have been sold for this year; however, alligator trapping "agent" permits are available for \$52. Agent permits enable permit holders to assist a licensed trapper in taking alligators but only in the presence of that trapper." For a brief second or two I toyed with the idea of

getting an "agent" permit and going out with a licensed trapper for the experience. I eventually came to my senses and thought better of the idea.

But some of you may be interested in the adventure or may want to learn about alligator hunting. Heck, some of you may even hold a gator hunting permit but don't really know what to do. So the FWC is offering classes to educate those interested. Read on:

FWC OFFERS GATOR-HUNTING CLASSES

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is offering alligator hunters nocost, three-hour classes to help them prepare for the Aug. 15 – Nov. 1 statewide alligator harvest. Reservations are not required to attend a class.

Attendance is not

mandatory for licensed hunters, but the FWC recommends that participants attend, especially if they have not previously hunted for alligators. Class topics include preparing for the hunt, hunting techniques and safety, harvesting and processing, caring for your alligator hide and alligator hunting rules and regulations. Also, persons who do not have an alligator harvest permit can attend if they want to learn what hunting alligators is all about.

Classes will be offered at the following locations:

July 26, 1-4 p.m. - Dania Beach, IGFA Fishing Hall of Fame and Museum, 300 Gulf Stream Way. For directions, call 954-922-4212 or visit www.igfa.org.

New fishing regulation goes into effect today

id you know that a new fishing regulation goes into effect today? Yep, with little fanfare the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration has banned recreational anglers from harvesting sandbar and silky sharks from the federal waters of the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean effective on July 24, 2008.

The new rule will have a modest effect on most local anglers. Few silky sharks are landed in local waters but there is a fairly productive local fishery for sandbar sharks (often called brown sharks by Gulf anglers). Most of the sandbar sharks caught in this area are adult fish in the 5- to 8-foot size range, and most seem to be caught a few miles offshore in the Gulf in the

late winter and early spring. Sandbar sharks have two identifying characteristics that help distinguish them from other sharks that are similar in appearance: Sandbar sharks have larger pectoral and dorsal fins than do most other sharks, and sandbar sharks are one of only a few species that have a hard, almost solid ridge that runs along the top of their back rearward of the dorsal fin. Other sharks with such a dorsal ridge include silky sharks and dusky sharks. Since dusky sharks are already a protected species, starting today any time a Gulf angler fishing in federal waters catches a shark with a dorsal ridge, that shark will have to be released.

Federal waters in the Gulf of Mexico are those waters more than 9 nautical miles offshore of Florida's Gulf coast. State waters lie inside the 9mile boundary and at this time Florida has not added sandbar or silky sharks to the list of sharks protected in state waters. In the past, Florida regulations have tended to follow the federal regulations, so it seems likely that Florida will follow suit and eventually ban the harvest of these two species in inshore waters, perhaps as soon as January 1. This would mean that next year's sandbar shark fishing, which usually gets underway in February or March, would be all catch-and-release.

Granted there are only a few anglers who catch and keep sandbar sharks affected by this new rule, but it was almost a lot

worse. In the originally proposed draft of this new rule NOAA had proposed a ban on the recreational harvest of blacktip, spinner, bull and some other species of sharks in addition to the ban on sandbars and silkys. NOAA's reasoning: Many shark species are similar in appearance and recreational anglers can't be trusted to correctly identify the species of sharks they land. A public outcry regarding this overly broad ban on recreational shark harvest caused NOAA to reconsider and the final result was that only sandbars and silkys have been added to the list of protected shark species. Sometimes the fisherv managers do listen to angler comments. In the coming months NOAA

will try to educate anglers about shark identification by producing booklets and pamphlets describing the

most common species. By the way, the National Marine Fisheries Service has just announced that blacknose sharks are overfished and new regulations will be forthcoming to limit the harvest of these small but very common sharks. It never ends.

Why choose a type I (offshore) life jacket? water about 80 percent

id you ever wonder how a life jacket with 15 to 22 pounds of buoyancy could keep a 200pound person afloat? If you tie a 22-pound block to an offshore or type I life jacket (22 pounds of buoyancy) the jacket will keep the block suspended in the water. Tie the same jacket to a 23-pound block, and the block will sink to the bottom. pulling the jacket down with it. So how does that life jacket keep a 200pound adult afloat?

A human body has natural flotation; an overweight person has more flotation than a well-muscled and lean person (muscle is denser than fat). When in the

of your body is submerged and has a neutral buoyancy, so the life jacket only needs to support the weight of the 20 percent that is above water, minus the natural buoyancy of your body fat. An average person has about 15 percent body fat, which is lighter than water and provides additional flotation. In the case of our 200pound person, that 15 percent body fat actually provides 30 pounds of buoyancy (15 percent of

200 pounds).

Now we need to follow the math closely. Our 200-pound person has neutral buoyancy for the 80 percent that is submerged in the water (80 percent of 200 pounds is 160 pounds). So 160 pounds is floating neutrally in the water and being aided by an additional buoyancy of 30 pounds from his body fat (15 percent of 200 pounds is 30 pounds). The 160 plus 30 is 190 and leaves a 200-pound person with only 10 pounds to be buoyed up

by the life jacket. Thus a life jacket with 22 pounds of buoyancy can keep him afloat. The most common

hat better way to catch bass than to throw a Rat-L-Trap through the hydrilla waiting for a strike to occur? When it does, the fight can make landing a bass in this type of cover extremely difficult. Sometimes, you have to pull through the hydrilla just to see if the fish is still hooked to the lure.

There are a few things you can do to improve your catch ratio when fishing any type of crankbait in grassy cover. Depending on how thick the cover is, I like to

change the size of the hooks I use on my baits.

If the cover is sparse and scattered, I like to put on a slightly bigger treble hook. The bait has less of a tendency to get caught up in the cover when it is

scattered or thinned out. The bigger treble hook allows you to get a better hook-up when the fish bite, and there is a less likely chance of a fish throwing the hook while you are getting it back to the boat.

If the cover is a little thicker and harder to get the bait through, I like a smaller treble hook. This gets hung up in the cover a little less and makes it easier to get the bait through it. There is one drawback to this however. When you have a fish hooked up and he wants to come to the

surface, the smaller treble hooks do not seem to hold as well as the larger sizes. The fish has the ability to throw the hook, especially when it has the added weight of the cover hanging all over the hook.

Just this past weekend my partner Missy and I were fishing in our couples club and using this technique. She had a larger size treble hook on her bait, while I threw a smaller one with smaller treble hooks. She managed to land the big fish of the tournament, but struggled at times

getting her bait through the heavier hvdrilla we were fishing in. I managed to boat three fish in the same hydrilla mainly due to the fact that I could get the bait through the cover easier than she could. The smaller hooks were not getting hung up as much as the larger hooks appeared to be.

Combined, we managed a strong second place finish that moved us to within two points of the club championship. That will be determined on the next and final tournament of the year.

Just don't be afraid to throw those treble hooks into the hydrilla. If you can find a spot where it is a little thinned out and there are baitfish present, it can sure be a bait that catches a lot of bass. Pav attention to the hook sizes though. It will make the difference in how many you get hooked as well as how many you land.

Spoons are highly effective lures

hen I was about eight years old my dad gave me my very first fishing lure. It was a classic red and white Daredevl chosen from his gigantic collection of spoonshaped lures. I'll bet that somewhere in your tackle box you will find that famous smiling Satan logo. After all, Daredevls (and yes, that is spelled correctly) used to dominate the North American spoon market.

But there are a lot more competitors out there now: FINN, Luhr-Jensen, Nestor, Foilistic, etc. I was sorting through a mess of tackle on one of the rainy days last week. Golly gee, I don't remember buying all those spoons. Some of were pretty crusty. Some were new in the package. But I found the one I was looking for — a gold spoon buzzer made by

Nemire Lures. It's basically a spoon with a rotating spinner on the front. Why was I looking for this one?

Well, right now we are at the peak of the summer heat / rain cycle. The backwaters are warm and full of fighting fish. But the water is getting dirty from the excessive runoff. That means baitfish are hovering high in the water table looking for tidbits. And the gamefish are more

likely to be attracted to the sound of thrashing bait. Heavily actioned spoons (like the one I have described) worked just under the surface are a great way to target surface feeding fish.

I have heard that you should retrieve these noisy lures relatively slowly, but don't let them sink down to the bottom. And make sure and hold the rod tip high. You can't really employ the "let it sit until they come back" approach that is commonly used with floating surface lures.

Here are some spoon-fed facts that might interest you: Most of these lures are actually very "fish friendly." The hooks are presented at the rear of the lure. This gives spoons a good hookup rate. Plus, this type of lure supports a single, rather than

multiple hook arrangement, which means unhooking fish is generally quick and easy. This means they have a better chance of surviving in the livewell or back in the water.

Generally made of metal, spoons sink, and therefore can be presented at anv water level. Spoons that have a high surface area to mass ratio will tend to flutter while sinking. This makes them a prime target on the drop and while being retrieved.

I am primarily a livebait fisherman. But I have a neighbor who fishes exclusively with artificial lures. He tells me that you should fish "regular" spoons a little faster than plugs. They are designed to have less resistance in the water and are extremely effective when fished

with a stop-start retrieve. Oh, and he gave me one more tip: Instead of jerking the rod tip as you would when fishing a weighted soft plastic, use a few quick winds on your reel.

I have a fair-sized collection of spoons in my tackle box — as every inshore fisherman should. But not surprisingly, I didn't come across that old red and white Daredevl from my father. It's probably rusting its life away hung on a tree branch near some Minnesota lake. And we both know how it got there. You can contact Tom

Big redfish and docks don't mix

Have you ever noticed that sometimes you can do everything right and still lose a nice fish, and at other times, you make every mistake in the book and still land it? This is a story about the latter.

While fishing alone and working a row of docks I hooked a big redfish. It wanted no part of coming out from under the dock with its barnacle-covered pilings, which gave it an advantage over me. Little by little, I began winning the battle and almost had it clear of the dock. The only trouble was the fish pulled me so close to the dock that I was running out of room. I countered by turning my trolling motor sideways and flooring it. Eighty pounds of thrust going one way and a desperate red pulling the other way, sure enough, over I went. There I was, treading water while holding my rod over my head with the red still pulling away. I managed to get back to my boat, but there was no way I could get back on, especially with my rod in one hand. I was, however, able to pull myself up high enough to stick the rod in one of the center console rod holders.

Now I had to get back into the boat. Between being slightly exhausted and weighed down with wet clothes, after several tries, I realized, "this isn't going to happen." I spotted a ladder on the back side of another

dock and decided that was my best bet. I was able to reach a bow line on the boat's front deck and began dog-paddling towards the dock with one hand while pulling the boat with the other, all the while, watching my \$100 Shimano Teramar rod bending in the shape of a C and thinking it would snap at any moment.

I reached the dock, tied the boat to the front side and swam under it to the ladder. It was one of those aluminum jobs with a latch on it, designed to keep the lower half out of the water. Naturally, the latch was corroded. After wrestling with it for at least a couple of minutes, I was finally able to lower it. I climbed up onto the dock, put the ladder back in place and jumped back in my boat. My rod was still bent to just short of its breaking point. The red was still on; I couldn't believe it. I grabbed the rod, but I was unable to move the

fish. It had wrapped itself around a lone piling between the docks. I motored toward it, loosened the drag and fortunately it swam back around the piling and towards open water. The battle didn't last too long after that — the red wasn't the only one who was pooped.

But that's not the end of the story. I noticed a dolphin in the area, but didn't think much of it. I reached down and grabbed the red and just as I was pulling it out of the water the dolphin came up from under the boat looking like Jaws. It just missed the fish and my hand.

The red was oversized, but it was in no condition to be released vet. especially with the dolphin still circling around. I coaxed it along for at least 10 minutes before it finally got its wind back and stayed belly down. I moved away from the dolphin and finally released the fish. As I watched the big bull scurry away, I thought to myself that it had to be thinking, "What the heck just happened?" I know I was.

nearshore, or type II, are the orange keyhole type. They are the least expensive and thus the most common. They have 15.5 pounds of flotation, will sometimes turn an unconscious person face up and are intended for use in areas where rescue may be quick — thus the name nearshore. An offshore life jacket, or type I, has 22 pounds of flotation, is designed to turn an unconscious person face up and is intended to be used where rescue may

take some time — thus the name offshore. When considering the high potential of trauma or hypothermia in instances of a man overboard, the value of a jacket that will float you face up while unconscious is immeasurable. And while the difference in 15.5 and 22 pounds of flotation initially seems small, it is in fact 42 percent more flotation. Depending on your total weight and body fat, that additional flotation can be the difference of floating in the water instead of pulling your life jacket with you as you sink to the bottom.

Remember that 23pound block? One pound can be the difference between sinking and floating. Hopefully the additional 42 percent of buoyancy and the capability to float you face up will be enough to convince you to invest in offshore, type I, life jackets. Don't be a 23-pound blockhead. Provide the best protection for you and your crew when selecting your safety gear. Bill Hempel is the

Golden Apple offers a five-in-one musical

FEATURES EDITOR "The Musical of Musicals: the Musical!" is more than a musical — it is an event.

Spoofing great American musicals of the past, "The Musical of Musicals: The Musical!" uses four talented performers to deliver one classic story five ways at Sarasota's Golden Apple Dinner Theatre. In this case the story is about a single girl (Jessica Hanson as June, Jeune, Junie Faye, Junita and Juny) who "can't pay the rent," her evil landlord (William Garon as Jidder, Jitter, Mr. Jitter Phantom Jitter and Jutter), a hero (Kip Taisy as Big Willy, Billy, William, Bill and Villy) and a matron (Cara Herman as Mother Abby, Abby, Auntie Abby, Abigail von Schtarr, Fraulein Abby)).

The music is in the style of Rogers and Hammerstein, Stephen Sondheim, Jerry Herman, Andrew Lloyd Webber and John Kander and Fred Ebb, Part of the fun of the show is that one recognizes the music and, sometimes the words, but there is always something about the way the words and music and spoofed and delivered that makes this show both funny and fun. Adding to the adventure, Apple producers invite those in the audience to figure out the musical source of the songs. There is even a mystery show. Answers can be found within the program.

As the show progresses, Garon manages to turn himself into just about every type of villain known to film and theater. In a spoof on "Cabaret" he is more like Joel Grav than Grev himself. The villain is the meatiest character in the show, and Garon has no trouble rising to the occasion in each and every scene. Nor do his fellow actors who each turn in fine performances of their own individual lists of characters.



'True West' is darkly moving

The Banvan Theatre's second offering of the summer, Sam Shepard's "True West," is one of those spell-binding stories, in which you fear you know what is going to happen and vou do but vou don't.

The story concerns two brothers: Lee, the bad seed, played by R. Ward Duffy and Austin, the perfect Ivy League graduate, good son and somewhat successful film writer, played by Eric Hissom.

Austin is house-sitting for their mother (Nina Hughes) who is away in Alaska. Also in

the cast is J. Bloomrosen as Saul Kimmer, a Hollywood producer.

As the story begins. Austin is hard at work on his next screenplay, despite the distractions emanating from his brother who is the personification of an angry man. One just knows that something bad is going to happen and not just to their mother's pristine home.

Lee, who is abysmally unkempt and dirty, lives in the desert and makes his living as a con man and thief. When he meets Sol, Lee "convinces" the producer that he has a

Western-movie story worth writing. As he is not a writer, the two decide that Austin will write it.

Hissom's characterization is right on the money throughout the production, which was crisply directed by Chris Dolman with a brilliant fight scene staged by Preston Boyd. That fight scene was so good opening night, July 16, I found myself fearful of what the outcome might be.

Duffy gives a brilliant interpretation of the brother who seems so evil yet has such concern for his alcoholic father and, possibly even for Austin.

Hughes manages to portray Mom as a good, if simple and almost simple-minded matronly mother, who seems to see both sons as equals and, in a way, perhaps they are.

Bloomrosen rounds out the troupe with his on-the-money portraval of a Hollywood producer.

James Florek's set and lighting helps set the tone for this classic Shepard work. The lighting almost becomes an additional character, so well does it advance the time line.



CHICAGO TRIBUNE NEW YORK — An American theater critic must cover Broadway. Here at the Chicago Tribune, the bosses like you to do so on the cheap. Thus, from the Shoreham to the Gorham, the Quality to the Hampton, the Best Western to the hotel of last resort, I've stayed at almost every tourist-class joint the theater district has to offer.

I've booked through Ouikbook, Hilton, Orbitz, Hotels.com, the old-fashioned telephone and, once, a Web site aimed at South Americans. And having done this now for some years and coupled with a travel nerd's love of getting the lowest possible price — I've learned some useful strategies.

If you're headed to Manhattan to see some shows or the tourist sights, here are 10 of my personal rules about Midtown hotels. And the first thing you have to know is that most of the usual rules don't apply in Manhattan.

• Rule No. 1: In New York, the chains are your friend

Many frequent travelers abhor the standardization of chain hotels. Well, save that love of the quirky hostelry for your next trip to Napa Valley. In Midtown, boutique is mostly code for smaller rooms, bigger attitudes and higher prices.

But chains have national standards to which even New York franchisees must adhere. And thus they tend to have bigger rooms, better service and more amenities. There's one caveat: The hotels have to be new, and you have to snag a room on a high floor for noise reasons.

But take the Hilton Garden Inn Times Square (790 8th Ave.; 212-581-7000; www.stayhgi.com) - my favorite Midtown hotel and the place where I am typing these words. The rooms have refrigerators, microwaves, flat-screen TVs. There's room to work. Almost every Broadway theater is within five blocks. And it's cheap. Relatively.

• Rule No. 2: In New York, brand status means nothing.

The Hampton Inn at 50th Street and 8th Avenue (212-581-4100;www.hamptoninn.com), another of my favorite New York hotels, has a concierge, a terrific staff and quite luxurious rooms. A Hampton Inn, you say? That's the cheapest of the Hilton brands and best known for sitting on the exit of a freeway. True. But in New York, it's got better service than the Sheraton. Which brings us to:

• Rule No. 3: In New York, prices depend on timing, not quality.

That Hampton Inn I just mentioned often charges well over \$350 a night. You have to adjust your expectations in Midtown; a room under \$250 is a cheap room. Everyone knows hotels vary pricing based on sophisticated predictors of demand. But in New York, the contrasts are eve-popping. The difference between pricing on different dates far eclipses the difference in pricing between hotels. In other words, the Waldorf Astoria on a lowdemand night will charge less than the Four Points by Sheraton on a high-demand night. So what should you do?

• Rule No. 4: Sundays are your friend.

Try to stay on a Sunday night. Midtown hotels are the

cheapest on that night; you can stay most Sundays for less than \$200. In general, the most expensive nights are Wednesdays and Thursdays, although weekend rates don't drop significantly. At certain times of year — the springbreak weeks in March and weekends in the fall — hotel rates in Midtown are stratospheric as hotels fill with school groups and shopping Europeans. You can easily pay \$400 a night for the crummiest joint. Best to go to New York instead in January, February, late April and May. The summer isn't bad either. And Thanksgiving weekend is a bargain.

• Rule No. 5: Prices usually drop nearer the stay.

Don't assume advance booking serves you well. Using chain Web sites, I recheck prices right up to cancellation deadlines. I switch hotels as prices drop nearer the night. Except for those peak times, room rates tend to fall. By significant amounts.

• Rule No. 6: If you want an independent, use Quikbook.

Most of the big hotel booking sites churn out the same rates in Midtown. And using the so-called opaque sites such as priceline.com is a sure way to get stuck with a room on the second floor - or, once, in my experience, the basement. For chains, use their own Web sites for the best deals. But Quikbook.com, a site that works with independent hotels, offers genuinely lower rates and a high degree of service and reliability.

I use Quikbook at highdemand times. I ended up recently at the Duane Street Hotel in Tribeca (130 Duane St.; 212-964-4600; www.duanestreethotel.com)

for about \$260 a night. Although the staffers were friendly, it was a classic boutique — trendy, tiny and noisy. Better independent choices in Midtown include the sedate, renovated Belvedere Hotel (319 W. 48th St.; 212-245-7000;

www.belvederehotelnvc.com) and the hipper-than-thou but oft-cheap Time Hotel (224 W. 49th St.; 877-846 3692; www.thetimeny.com)

• Rule No. 7: Ignore Trip Advisor.

Many travelers base their choices on the comments at tripadvisor.com, a site that lets guests review hotels. It's mostly useless for New York. The vast bulk of the comments come from people who are in various states of shock at New York prices and concepts of space.

• Rule No. 8: Consider Chelsea.

A lot of new hotels have opened near 8th Avenue in Chelsea. There is a decent new Holiday Inn Express

Skip the airfare and hotel bills: Couple shares tips for a 'stay-cation'

MCCLATCHY NEWSPAPERS Vacation this spring presented a challenge. With gas prices hovering around \$3.50 a gallon, we — my longtime sweetie Marilyn and I - didn't think it would be prudent to take a road trip. Recent airline problems made us skittish about flying, and we've grown weary of airport hassles anyway. We did consider a discount fare to New York, but scratched that idea after discovering hotels at this time of year were at least \$200 a night if you wanted little luxuries such as working plumbing and locking doors.

So we decided to stay home. But we didn't just sleep late and veg out to TV all day. Instead, we decided to treat Dallas-Fort Worth as a destination, much as if we'd traveled

here from someplace else, even though we've both lived here for at least 10 years.

Turns out it's possible to vacation at home and feel like you've made a getaway. Sort of.

If you and your struggling bank account are thinking about just staying home this year, here are some things to consider:

BREAK THE ROUTINE

Of course, merely not working is a break in the routine. But sometimes work comes home with you — in your brain, and you have to shake it off. So from the beginning, we set some ground rules.

No work talk, or doing anything that reminds us of work. This is practically impossible for two journalists, but we largely succeeded in this, although it took changing our computer's home page to get

away from journalism Web sites. But if a couple who works at the same place can pull this off, you can, too.

No cooking at home (and especially no cost-saving microwaved frozen lunches). We ate all our meals out, the way we would on vacation, because a big part of travel for us is exploring restaurants in other cities. Because we didn't splurge on airfare or hotels, we felt more comfortable plunking down money for relatively pricey lunches.

Corollaries to this rule: (1) Don't eat at regular hangouts. Every place we ate was, if not new, someplace we've only been once or twice. (2) Wine or beer at lunch isn't essential, but at least it's an option, unlike on a workday. (3) Don't worry about slow service, and in fact luxuriate in places

known for food that's too good to rush. If there's a fancy or out-of-the-way place you've been wanting to try, a stay-athome vacation is just the time to do it.

Do things you've never done before. But if there's a place you've been meaning to go, cross it off your list.

Be spontaneous. One Tuesday morning, Marilyn was on the Internet, looking for something to do, when she saw that alt-country artists Steve Earle and Allison Moorer (Earle's wife) were playing in Dallas. Ordinarily, we wouldn't buy day-of tickets, especially on a "school night," but the freedom of being off allowed us to quickly decide we wanted to go. And the fact that we weren't working the next day made things less stressful when the concert ended at

midnight and we still had an hour's drive home.

TIPS FOR TURNING HOMETOWN INTO A TOURIST DESTINATION

While sticking close to home, we thought of some things that might have made this feel like even more of a vacation experience.

Go to a convention and visitors bureau or hotel to pick up brochures on local points of interest.

Try to get along without a car, at least part of the time. We're experienced travelers, and we've navigated London, Paris, San Francisco and Washington using public transportation (to be honest, Marilyn is the one who's good at this; if it weren't for her, I'd probably have spent the past few years on the same bus in the Bay area).

212-627-1888;

www.starwoodhotels.com). They're all less than 10 minutes by train from Broadway theaters, and Chelsea now is a terrific neighborhood in which to shop, eat and stroll.

• Rule No. 9: Corporate rates probably won't help.

The company you work for may have negotiated set rates — the Chicago Tribune, for example, has a deal with the fraved New York Helmsley (212 E. 42nd

St.: 212-490-8900: www.helmslevhotels.com) on the East Side. I can almost always beat that price on my own. And when I can't, it's usually not available.

• Rule No. 10: Forget the cab from LaGuardia.

No point in saving money if you blow \$45 on a cab from LaGuardia Airport. Instead, walk past the cab line and take the O33 bus from right outside the terminal (you'll need \$2 in change, but there's a machine right

by the bus stop). Ride 20 minutes, get off at the last stop in Jackson Heights and hop an express E train to Midtown. You'll often get there quicker and for only \$2 (a metrocard gets you a free transfer to the subway, or if you don't have one, it's still only \$4). That's almost enough of a saving to buy a ticket to a Broadway show at the TKTS booth, temporarily located at the Marriott Marquis Hotel, which is always beyond my budget.

Prices may be high, but you can still take that summer trip with these cost-cutting tips

STAR TRIBUNE (MINNEAPOLIS) The dollar tanked long ago. Now the prices of gas and airline tickets are soaring — as is the cost of a gallon of milk. In the face of this economic storm, hail begins to fall — the real stuff, pounding the roof over your head. You turn on the television for a weather update only to find political pundits prattling on about the presidential candidates.

Just when it seems you can't afford a summer vacation, you've probably never needed one more.

Take heart. There are ways to get out of town without breaking the bank. We asked travel experts and dug through savvy sources to uncover ways to save on that much-needed, well-deserved summer getaway, whether it's a grand tour of Europe or a road trip to Grandma's house.

HOTELS:

· Check rates with hotel Hotel-booking Web sites such as Hotels.com aren't always your best option. Sometimes you can

get a better deal by going to the hotel's site or calling the hotel directly.

• Shun the 800 number

Don't call a hotel's 800 number to make a reservation; you'll likely be directed to the national center. Call the hotel directly and ask for the manager on duty, who is motivated to fill rooms, and begin negotiating for a discount.

• Call at the last minute

Hotels with open rooms may discount rates. A trick: Secure a room at an inexpensive chain that allows cancellations. A day or two before arriving, call the swank hotel you really want to stay in and ask for their lowest rate. If you get a good deal, cancel your first hotel.

• Ask for deals

If you're staying through the week, ask for a weekend rate for the entirety of your stay. If you're a member of groups such as AAA, ask for a discount.

AIRFARE:

• Research before you book The more you understand the market, the better your odds for finding the best price because you'll know a deal when you see it. For a quick education, log onto www.farecast.com to view charts that show past price trends for a particular route and predict when prices will be lowest in the future. A watchdog site can also help: www.airfarewatchdog.com sends out alerts about most bargain fares from a given airport; www.travelocity.com and other booking sites will send e-mail alerts when airfares on chosen routes drop or rise significantly.

Join airlines' sites

More airlines are using promotional rates and e-mail offers to lure traffic to their Web sites. By signing up for e-mail alerts at your commonly used airlines, you get notice of these fares.

• Log onto meta-search sites My favorite is www.kayak.com, which checks almost all airlines' fares and presents them at a glance, along with charts that show the price trend for that route. It also offers an option to check rates three days before and after your preferred dates. Flying legs of a journey overseas? Check out www.dohop.com.

• Get and use your miles Northwest is among airlines

that are enticing its members to use frequent flier miles to offset the price of a ticket. For nearly a vear, Sun Country has also offered a frequent-flier program.

The Ghost Soldiers': The sad details of everyday life are distilled into a brilliant collection

SOUTH FLORIDA SUN-SENTINEL James Tate is the Jerry Seinfeld of American poetry.

You'll remember Seinfeld, the '90s sitcom famously dubbed "a show about nothing." Here's part of Charles Simic's blurb for Tate's new collection, "The Ghost Soldiers": "To write a poem out of nothing at all is Tate's genius. Just about anything can happen next in this kind of poetry and that is its attraction."

Tate's been called worse, especially during the 1970s, when his poems were deemed cerebral, cold, vacant, with little substance beneath the surface dazzle.

Since his emergence at age 23, when his first collection, "The Lost Pilot" (1967), earned selection for the Yale Series of Younger Poets, even admirers have struggled to describe Tate's hypnotically idiosyncratic verse, often quite funny, with its non sequiturs, dream logic, grisly imagery and conversational language.

I can't claim to have read anything close to all of Tate's work. For a poet, he's amazingly productive, with 15 books of poetry, most of them much fatter than the standard 64-page collection. "The Ghost Soldiers" alone, by my count, includes 94 poems. But whatever doldrums, if any, Tate may have traversed midcareer, he's long past them. His National Book Award and Pulitzer Prize came later, in the 1990s.

Not to contradict a distinguished poet and critic such as Simic, but "The Ghost Soldiers" is far from being about nothing. These poems engage everything from war to police-state oppression to romance to small-town family life. Aliens make appearances, as do mythical creatures, talking animals, shadowy government agencies and malevolent corporations. Tate is clearly responding to contemporary issues. The war in Iraq, though never mentioned, looms behind many of the poems. Here's an excerpt from "The March":

"I was standing next to the captain at the bottom of the mountain. "Shoot them all!" he ordered. "But, captain, they're our men," I said. "No they're not. My men were well-trained and disciplined. Look at this mess here. They are not my men. Shoot them!" he again ordered. I raised my rifle, then turned and smacked him in the head with the butt of it. Then I knelt and handcuffed him. The soldiers gathered about me and we headed for home. Of course, none of us knew where that was, but we had our dreams and our memories. Or I think we did."

You'll notice how this reads like narrative prose. Tate abandoned traditional versification long ago, causing some puzzled critics to reach for new descriptors, one even going so far as to call them "small movies" - ridiculous, what with the perfectly fine term "prose-poetry" close at hand. I'll admit to wondering midway through this collection what qualifies these pieces as poems instead of, say, highly compact absurdist short stories. By the end, I had something of an answer: condensed language, for one thing; intensity of effect for another. And something ineffable: They just are poems, no matter how prosev they appear.

And Tate, by some legerdemain, endows the disparate elements of each poem, and the collection as a whole, with a variety of meaning that also resists classification. A new reader might be frustrated by Tate's surrealism — that's the one description that's stuck to him: American surrealist — while another might want to read slowly, as I did in the early going, savoring and digesting each poem in turn. But the book gains a ferocious momentum, and by the halfway point I found myself gulping them down as fast as I could, one enlarging the morbid pleasures of the next.

Tate once wrote, in a line sometimes used to illustrate a supposed heartlessness, "Of course it's a tragic story; that's why it's so funny." But doesn't that sum up the human condition? We're all going to die, life is often absurd, and yet every day we find something to laugh about.

That's the real genius of "The Ghost Soldiers." By locating humor in tragedy, by highlighting the false connections by which we mortals construct daily life, Tate distills the sad little details of existence into a potent elixir, at once pathetic and noble.

'The X-Files: I Want to Believe'

It's a mystery worthy of Fox Mulder's scrutiny: Why make a theatrical motion picture of that iconic '90s TV series "The X-Files" six years after the last original episode aired? Nobody's doing "Seinfeld: The Movie," "Friends Forever" or "Walker, Texas Ranger, Rides Again."

But "The X-Files" is science fiction, and as we know from Trekkies or Trekkers or whatever the FC (fannishly correct) term is these days, sci-fi love never dies. And this past February at the WonderCon convention in San Francisco, those true believers known as X-Philes were sending X's as in kisses — to the movie's producers and stars on a panel promoting "The X-Files: I Want to Believe," opening Friday.

From the screams and squeals captured in a featurette on the new DVD episode-set "The X-Files: Revelations," you'd think Elvis was in the building.

"We wanted this movie to work for and be loved by fans of the show," says former series executive producer Frank Spotnitz, who wrote and produced the movie with "X-Files" creator Chris Carter.



"But if it only works for them," he frets, "it's not a success."

It does make your mind boldly go to "Star Trek: The Motion Picture" (1979), released 10 years after the TV series ended and five years after the Saturday-morning animated spinoff. Like that first "Star Trek" movie, the 1998 film "The X-Files" got a middling reception at best. And if this second film turns things around like the critical and commercial hit "Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan," stars David Duchovny and Gillian Anderson might just wind up this generation's William Shatner and Leonard Nimoy (or, perhaps, Nichelle Nichols).

The movie takes place six years after the events of the series finale, which, bizarrely, echoed the final "Seinfeld": a trial, with recurring characters from the series showing up to testify and yada yada yada. In the end, FBI agent Fox Mulder (Duchovny) — investigator of aliens, monsters and other things that go bump on the screen — escaped his kangaroo court with the help of, among others, his FBI superior, Walter Skinner (Mitch Pileggi, who appears in the film). Mulder goes on the run with his no-longer-skeptical partner, Dana Scully (Anderson). We last see them together in a hotel room, pondering the future and what to believe in.

Unlike "Lost," which has a similarly supernatural backstory mythos, the final "X-Files" seasons were all dangling and muddled loose ends. If the producers ever had a planned-ahead revelation, answer or overall point, it had gotten, well, lost.

"The show clearly didn't unfold the way anybody anticipated," Spotnitz says. "It doesn't have the great circularity of a novel. It changed gears in ways we hadn't anticipated. I understand why a lot of fans weren't as emotionally invested in those last two years as in the rest."

The harsh realm of reality didn't help. "I have come to believe the show ended when it did because of the post-9/11

mood of the country," Spotnitz says. "I remember the Sunday New York Times Magazine a couple weeks after 9/11 having a list of things that were 'in' and 'out,' and 'The X-Files,' it said, was out. And I thought, 'Why would we be out?' And when we came back on TV after that, the audience just didn't show up for season nine. People felt it was an antigovernment show, and out of step with the mood of the country."

Now? "My sense is we're now in a 'post-post-9/11' frame of mind."

McCLATCHY NEWSPAPERS Chalk up another win for Cook's Corner sleuths: We've got the signature Key lime pie recipe from the Fern Inn in Islamorada, Fla., home of a renowned version of the South Florida favorite in the 1950s and '60s.

Reader Elizabeth Nichols remembered clipping it years ago, but alas, it was not to be found in The Miami Herald archives. We turned over the quest to our readers.

"The headline said 'Pie recipe "really" lost this time," but I'll bet I'm not the only reader who still has this clipping," said Bonnie J. Rothschild.

"As long as you've got old native Floridians like me around, no Key lime pie recipe will ever be lost," wrote Liz Goering.

"I have reverently retrieved and scanned this brittle, beloved treasure from my archives," said Becky Bleser. "I've made this pie many times over many years, always to rave reviews."

Quite a few others wrote to praise the recipe, which first appeared in July 1975 in Action Line after the death of innkeeper Fern Butters.

Butters came to Miami with her husband, Ed, in 1926. They owned several hotels in the Keys, including The Fern Inn at Mile Marker 81 (1950-1967). Her pie reportedly was a favorite of Harry Truman, Ernest Hemingway and even Julia Child.

Butters would never reveal her recipe. After her death, her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Jack Butters, shared it with Miami Herald readers, with this admonition: "It is of the utmost importance to follow directions exactly as given."

"Believe it or not, my mother, Berniece Head, has a copy of the original article and a subsequent request for the recipe for the Key lime pie," wrote Bob Head. "She has made it over the years and it has always been a great hit."

Colleen Vance recalled that she first used the recipe as a newlywed in 1978. "My husband's family loved this pie. I still have the original newspaper cutout and still fix the pie to rave reviews."

Alicia Hidalgo says she recalls Fern Butters' as "the" key lime pie to get in the Keys. "Grani Frani says simply, 'Fern Butter's pie was world famous."

Bleser notes that the pie doesn't keep well. "The meringue tends to weep, get a bit sticky after a day or two — but it's a truly beautiful thing the day you make it and tastes out of this world!"

Made in a 10-inch pie plate, this is a spectacular dessert with a meringue that towers majestically. We're so glad we got to try it.

Wanda Gates of LaGrange, Ohio, wrote to remind us of another Key lime pie recipe she thought readers might like,
from Parker's Lighthouse in
Palm Beach Gardens.cream of tartar for five full

"I read the request in my newspaper and dug out my clipping from the late 1970s or early '80s when we spent our winters in Key Largo," she wrote. "I really like the recipe because it uses no eggs at all."

FERN INN KEY LIME PIE 1 (14-ounce) can sweetened condensed milk

6 eggs, separated (see note below)

1/2 cup Key lime juice

1 tablespoon cream of tartar

1 cup sugar

1 baked 10-inch pie shell (two 8-inch shells may be substituted)

Whip condensed milk and egg yolks together until light and creamy (regular electric beater, medium speed, about 8 minutes). Add the Key lime juice; let rotate at low speed for 1 second. Fold a few times with rubber spatula to be sure juice is thoroughly blended. Pour into baked pie shell; let stand.

Beat the egg whites with the

cream of tartar for five full minutes. Add the sugar and beat 5 full minutes. Put on pie and brown in 350-degree oven (about 8 minutes, on middle rack). Chill before serving. Makes 10 servings.

Note: To avoid any risk of salmonella, you may wish to use pasteurized eggs.

Per serving: 370 calories (29 percent from fat), 12.2 g fat (5.3 g saturated, 4.6 g monounsaturated), 145.1 mg cholesterol, 8.7 g protein, 57.8 g carbohydrates, 0.2 g fiber, 200.3 mg sodium.

PARKER'S LIGHTHOUSE KEY LIME PIE

1 (14-ounce) can sweetened condensed milk

1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened 3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons

fresh-squeezed Key lime 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 1 homemade graham cracker crust, baked in a 9-inch, deep-dish pie pan

Place the condensed milk, cream cheese, lime juice and vanilla in a food processor or, if available, the large bowl of an electric mixer fitted with a wire whisk beater. (At the restaurant, they used a commercial-size blender.) Blend or whisk on medium speed for 15 minutes.

Place filling in the cooled, baked crust and refrigerate at least 8 hours before serving. Garnish with fresh whipped cream and twisted lime slices. Makes 8 servings.

Ringling Museum hosts 'Phantasmagoric' show

Circus and real estate tycoon John Ringling bequeathed one of the word's most valuable collections of Impressionistic art to the people of Florida.

That it came with his John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art was a bonus. Today considered one of the 20 most valuable museums in the United States, the museum continues to broaden its public offerings with new acquisitions and traveling shows.

Its current such special show is Phantasmagoria: Specter of Absence, which continues through Aug. 10 in the new Ulla R. and Arthur F. Searing Wing.

Think shadows, death, mystery, illusion, allusion, static art and animated art. Most art evokes feelings and thoughts. This show may inspire viewers to search the depth of their own souls and the way in which they view this world and, perhaps, that other world, whatever that other world is.

The exhibition includes installations, videos, drawings and objects sharing the common theme of absence or loss — a total of 12 mixed media works by artists from around the world.

One of the least complicated works is a black and white cartoon-like drawing, inspired by a person in the act of making shadows on the wall, using hands and fingers. It was created by Julie Nord in 2007 with a black marker pen and water paint. At the other extreme are works that use projectors, mirrors, water, a fog machine and/or videos to tell their stories. If there is a common thread to the works in the exhibition it is shadows — those images that result from an absence of light.

The term "phantasmagoria" is an 18th-century word to describe the projections of moving shadows and other effects used in traveling shows of that time. The familiar was blown out of proportion, often affecting the viewers's emotions — often in dark and even scary ways.

In the Ringling show, contemporary artists have used the same techniques but with the addition of modern technology not available 100 years ago to call forth similar emotions with their often ghostly images.

Imagine looking at a mirror and not seeing yourself but instead seeing the image nearly swallowed in a fog. Artist Jeppe Hein used this technique to ask the viewer to explore his or her feelings in regard to loss — up to an including the ultimate loss death.

In addition to Hein, the artists include Christian Boltanski (French painter), Jim Campbell (American electronic artist), Michel Delacroix (French painter), Laurent Grasso (French installation artist), William Kentridge (South African, film animation), Rafael Lozano-Hemmer (Mexican-Canadian, Large-scale installations), Teresa Margolles (Mexican, forensic inspired art), Oscar Munoz (Colombian

That Sarasota area is considered by many to be the cultural center of Florida can be traced to John Ringling's decision to build his art museum in Sarasota. That is a whole other story. For now, enjoy a day at the Ringling — one of the 20 most valuable art museums in the United States.



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
